Dear Tanglewood Families,

March and April are very busy months! Our testing season begins with iReady diagnostic for students in grades 3-5 beginning on March 8th and 9th with ELA. March 15th and 16th, students in grades 3-5 take the iReady math diagnostic. Mark your calendars for the following days - Friday, March 18 there is NO SCHOOL due to Professional Duty Day for teachers. This also marks the end of quarter 3. Also, there is NO SCHOOL the week of March 21 - 25 due to spring vacation.

Students in grades 3-5 begin FSA testing in April. Here is the schedule:

- April 4......Grades 4 and 5 take FSA Writing
- April 5 and 6.....3rd grade ELA
- May 3 and 4.....Grades 4 and 5, ELA
- May 10 and 11......Grades 3, 4, and 5 take Math
- May 17 and 18......5th grade Science

Please make sure your child is well rested, on time and at school each day for these important assessments! As a Leader in Me Lighthouse school, each month we focus on one of the 8 Habits. MESSAGE FROM OUR INFO SPECIALIST

Tardiness – Tardiness is defined as a student not being in the classroom when the class is scheduled to begin. Parents must follow the same process to excuse a tardy as they do to excuse an absence. Excessive tardiness shall be addressed on a case-by-case basis to determine if there is a pattern of non-attendance. Non-attendance for instructional activities is established by tardiness, early sign-outs, or absences for all or any part of the day. Tardiness to any class without documentation may be considered unexcused. Habitual tardiness is defined as six or more tardies to school or to an individual class per quarter. Principals have the discretion to excuse tardiness for extenuating circumstances. Unless excused under the provisions of this policy, accumulated tardiness will be recorded as unexcused absences.

Early Sign-Outs – Early sign-outs are defined as a parent or guardian signing out a child before the end of the school day. No student shall be released within the final 30 minutes of the school day unless the principal/designee determines it is an emergency. All schools shall establish procedures for early release that ensure that all students are treated consistently. Excessive early sign-outs will be addressed on a case-by-case basis to determine if there is a pattern of non-attendance. Unless excused under the provisions of this policy, accumulated early sign-outs will be recorded as unexcused absences.

Florida State Statue 1012.42 recognizes that teachers at times must be assigned duties in a class outside the field in which the teacher is certified. The following teachers at Tanglewood Elementary School are fully certified, but are engaged in training to add the endorsement English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) to their current certificate. It is very important for students to be present and on time each day for instruction. Did you know...Chronic absence — missing 10 percent or more of school days due to absence for any reason—excused, unexcused absences and suspensions, can translate into students having difficulty learning to read by the third-grade, achieving in middle school, and graduating from high school (attendanceworks.org)?
